Thursday and our plan for today was to get to Bathurst a distance of

172km via Cowra. At Cowra there is a Japanese garden that was begun by the POW's during the second world war. We called in to see it and have lunch. This is a beautiful garden and a must see if you are

passing through Cowra. From Cowra we motored on to Bathurst, arriving early in the afternoon. John had previously made enquiries to see if we would be able to drive around Mt Panorama, but was told the roads would be closed off due to the 6 hour race on the Easter Weekend. So we decided to see how close we could get to the track.





To our surprise we drove straight in the main gate following race cars on trail-

ers and service vehicles and on to pit straight, under the bridge past the pits and over the start line and around "Hell Corner" until we got to the road block on mountain straight just past the pit paddock entrance.
